Dear Friends,

During Easter we have remembered with great gratitude the death of the Lord Jesus Christ and celebrated with joy his resurrection and whilst no one knows the exact time of these amazing events the most important fact is that they actually occurred. However, fundamentally and essentially linked to these events is the **ascension** of the Lord that has huge implications for a number of significant reasons.



The conclusion of Christ's earthly ministry

The first Russian cosmonaut, on his return to earth, foolishly declared that he did not see God or heaven on his journey. However, at the poignant meeting between Mary and Jesus, after his resurrection, he told her that **he would** ascend to his Father 'I am ascending to my Father and to your Father' (John 20:17). This happened forty days later when before his gathered disciples he was taken up into heaven (Acts 1:9-11; see Luke 24:50-53). The ascension represents the culmination of the Lord's earthly work. His death and resurrection could only find their crucial significance and consequence when Jesus ascended to his Father to whom he presented his finished work of atonement. In his ascension the manhood of Jesus was transformed – now the glorious Lord of heaven and earth. There is an exalted and glorified Man in heaven – the firstfruits of salvation and the assurance of eternal life to all who believe in him (1 Cor 15:20-23).

The commencement of Christ's heavenly ministry

Our Saviour has now ascended to 'prepare a place' (John 14:3) for his people in heavenly 'mansions' (v.2) (dwelling places or rooms) where he sits at the right hand of God as their compassionate high priest – 'we have a great High Priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God' (Heb 4:14). Because our Saviour 'was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin' we can approach 'boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need' (v.15-16) because he 'makes intercession for (us)' (Heb 7:25). Some hesitate to affirm that heaven is an actual place or that Jesus ascended there. However, God gave Stephen the ability to see the world that is now hidden from our eyes, for he 'gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God' (Acts 7:55-56). Heaven is real place in God's universe and Christ is there – a real Man.

The commencement of the Holy Spirit's earthy ministry

The Lord promised the Holy Spirit to his disciples, but he would only be sent after his ascension. Prior to his death Jesus taught his disciples 'It is to your advantage that I go away; for if I do not go away, the Helper will not come to you; but if I depart, I will send him to you' (John 16:7). Apart from the necessity of Christ's ascension, as stated above, he could not, owing to the constraints of his physical body, accomplish the ministry that only the Holy Spirit could do. It was only the Spirit who could apply the Saviour's work to God's elect (Titus 3:4-8) and dwell within them (John 14:17). Though the following was addressed to the apostles they apply to all believers – the Holy Spirit will guide them into all truth (John 16:13); tell them of things to come (v.13); help them to glorify Christ (vs.13-14) and teach them about Christ (v.15).

On the Day of Pentecost the Spirit was poured out on the awaiting disciples and empowered by him they began immediately to preach the good news (Acts 2). Many were wonderfully saved (v.41, see Acts 4:4). Down through the centuries many millions have been saved by God's grace through faith in Christ (Eph 2:8-9) as the Holy Spirit has applied his work of redemption to the lives of repentant sinners. We can rest assured 'That whoever calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved (Acts2:21).

The conclusion of the Holy Spirit's earthly ministry

Today the Holy Spirit is still working in the world to bring sinners to God, through Christ, and he will continue till the last of God's 'blood bought' children is added to the Saviour's eternal kingdom. The culmination of the work of the Spirit will happen at the same time when the Lord returns to establish his kingdom (1 Thess 4:13-18). What a great joy it is for believers to know that they will be either translated or resurrected on 'the great and awesome day of the LORD' (Acts 2:20) and to be conformed to the likeness of their Lord and Saviour. What a privilege we have, as Christians, to bring the good news of a Saviour who died to pay the price of sin, but who is now risen from the dead and ascended into heaven, and one day will return to this earth in great power and glory to judge the world in righteousness and truth (2 Tim 4:1).

'For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures, and that He was seen by Cephas, then by the twelve.' (1 Corinthians 15 v3-5)

The reason why the Easter Holiday Club is held each year is because of the fundamental importance of Jesus' death, and resurrection. As a result we are very thankful to God for around 80 children who came for the two days, and who heard about these truths that we celebrate at Easter. As in previous years, there was the option for the children to take part in either football, or crafts, throughout the day; with the group splitting into two for the Bible sessions as well. The theme for this year was the life of Jonah, and we were all encouraged by how well the children listened. At the end of the second day there was a chance for the parents to hear about what their children had been getting up to during the club.

With the older group, various leaders took charge of organising games, teaching the memory verse (1 Corinthians 15 v3-4), and leading quizzes about the talk they had just heard. The talks were focussing particularly on how Jonah is like a signpost pointing us to Jesus. We saw how Jonah being thrown into the sea, swallowed by a great fish, and spat out again, points us to Jesus' death, burial and resurrection. We also marvelled at God's undeserved kindness to Jonah, and to the Ninevites. The children listened carefully, and seemed to have enjoyed themselves. Thank you to all the leaders who gave up their time, and were so willing to serve during the club!

25 YEARS OF EASTER HOLIDAY CLUBS

In 1989 David and Carolyn Kight organised and led our very first Holiday Club. Each morning for five days we welcomed the children in to the Hall for "Luke Street". Each day a door was opened to introduce a bible character. They saw Zacchaeus at the Guest's and Cheat's House, the Prodigal Son at



the Country House, the Paralytic at the Sick and Crowded House, Barabbas and the Crucifixion at the Secret House, and the Wise and Foolish Men at the Rich Leader's House. Carolyn accompanied the singing on her piano accordion. Some days the children were asked to bring a bible object, or dress up as a bible character, or wear a certain colour.

We have continued each year since then during the Easter school holidays. For quite a number of years we also ran a club for middle school children in the early evening, with the same theme as the morning club. With a few repeats, different titles for the Clubs were used each year. So we had "Signposts", "Follow the Leader", "Treasure Seekers", "Turning Point", "Great Discoveries", "Great Victories", "Great Escapes", "Young Climbers", "Code Breakers", "Turnabout Club", "Sailors' Club", "Follow the Leader", "Ark Tale", and "Crossroads".

After a high point when about 70 children came one year, numbers attending started to fall and in 2008 a new approach was agreed. That year we advertised Football Training and Craft as well as Bible stories, and the children had to be booked in beforehand. We give thanks to God that from then on our

Easter Holiday Clubs have been fully booked. Most of the children have no church background. We pray that the Gospel seed sown will bear fruit to the glory of God, and remember the hundreds of children who have heard the Gospel in the last 25 years. Thank you to all the

church members who have helped over the years. It is a real joy to have some of those who came as children now, as committed Christians, coming back to help as leaders.

Palace of Westminster Tour

On Thursday 4th April, it was our pleasure to have a tour of the Houses of Parliament in Westminster. Meeting at Westminster Bridge just after half ten, we shortly made our way to the entrance to the Palace of Westminster. After a brief security check, we arrived in Westminster Hall, the oldest part of the Palace of Westminster still in existence today. We were divided into two groups, before beginning our tour at the other end of the Palace.

We followed the route that the Queen takes during the State Opening

of Parliament, seeing the Queen's Robing Room, the Royal Gallery, and the Princes' Chamber. Then came the first of the actual Houses of Parliament, the elegant and impressive House of Lords. Our tour guide told us how the House of Lords works, and it was very interesting to hear about the less famous chamber of Parliament. Moving swiftly through the Peers' Lobby and Corridor, we came to the Central Hall, the busy crossroads of both houses.

Next up on our tour was the voting lobbies of the House of Commons, where we learnt about the House's voting procedure. We then had the chance to go into the House of Commons itself, seeing the famous chamber in all of its post-war glory, the original chamber having been destroyed in the Second World War. Following this, we

moved to St Stephen's Hall, which stands on the site of the original meeting place of the House of Commons, before returning to Westminster Hall after a very interesting tour. By David Norman

The four different parts are: Youth Parliament; Young Inspectors; Young Commissioners; and Youth Audits. Each group has its own specific job within C.B.Y.P.

We would like to thank you very much indeed for your kind letter and generous gift of £360, from brothers and sisters at Dunstable Baptist Church, for the help given by Andy Banton and Steve Burton at the Easter Holiday Club. We really appreciate everyone's kindness shown to the Mission in this way. May I also express my personal thanks to everybody who assisted with the Club, which was a great blessing.

Recently, there were two programmes on the television about life in Aylesbury Prison. It was really quite shocking to see the depths that some young men had sunk to in their lives. What a blessing then to know that the gospel is being taken into many prisons around the country. John Hawley goes into Bullingdon prison once a month and Andy Little goes into Woodhill Prison, also once a month. Both men have seen evidence of the Lord working in the hearts of various individuals. John recently met a former bank manager who asked for a Bible and on another occasion expressed real interest in the gospel. He was frustrated that his cell mate always had the TV on, while he wanted some peace and quiet to read and think.

Even better than that, was a man who admitted that he had been in and out of prison repeatedly over the last 24 years. However, he had recently come to know the Lord and was hungry to read the Bible. He shared that his family, who regularly visited him, had noticed a big change. He had also brought his cell mate to the meeting and he said that he had been impressed with the change he had seen in his friend. How we can praise the Lord for these opportunities to reach men, who, unlike so many in our society, already know they are sinners!

Grace Baptist Mission Prayer Waves April 2013

Saved2Serve: Jim Sayers reported back from the Saved2Serve conference attended by over 70 young people, the aim of which was to envision our young people and encourage a desire for mission. Simon Robinson (Shepherd Drive, Ipswich) brought the weekend's ministry and was very impressed by the willingness of the young people to engage with God's word, as well as by their passion for mission.

Please pray: that the young people will be good witnesses in their home churches.

Mission Centre changes: Daryl Jones, the new Mission Coordinator, is due to start work at the beginning of June, God willing. He will work alongside John McDonald through to the Annual Meetings in October. Daryl spoke about his background: Having worked with UCCF amongst students in London 30 years ago, he and Julia spent nearly 7 years in the pastorate at Limes Avenue (Aylesbury), supporting the sending of Liz and Malcolm Sunaski to Latvia. Since then he has been pastor for 10 years at Bethel Church in inner city Liverpool.

Please pray: for Daryl and Julia as they move to Abingdon next month. **Pray** that God will lead through this time of change. **Pray** that they will be a blessing to the missionaries as well as to the churches.

Kenya situation: Most of GBMs missionaries based in Kenya returned to the UK during the election period.

Graham & Sally Jones are very thankful for God's gracious answers to prayer. They reported that while the vote was being counted the situation was generally calm. The big issue has been how tribal loyalties affect voting patterns. In the last election, even Christians put tribe before faith, contributing to the violence. The testimony of the churches has been better this time. This is an issue for Christians to address – that they are firstly brothers and sisters in Christ, and tribe should be second. Graham & Sally plan returning to Kenya at the end of April, God willing.

Andrew & Danielle Gullett are now safely back in Nairobi.

Sukesh & Jenny Pabari stayed in Kenya over the election period. Sukesh reported that following the supreme court's announcement that Mr Kenyatta had won the election, there were some riots but the police were quick to act. The atmosphere is still very tense. **Please pray:** as the Bible commands us to do, for the political leaders in Kenya. Pray for a government that brings peace and stability.

Thank you for your prayers – this is a vital part of the work.

FINANCE

Finances for the First Quarter of 2013

For the first quarter of 2013 the Church finances were as follows:

Income £13,625 Expenditure £ 9,565 Excess £ 4,060

During the quarter we have benefited from the receipt of tax reclaimed (£356) on Gift Aid gifts given in the last quarter of 2012 and have just made a claim for a £2,050 tax repayment. During the first quarter we paid £530 for the web site design.

We thank all who have given to the work of the Church, over the last quarter, and we would record our thanks to the Lord for all He has provided for us. We pray that the Lord will continue to supply all our needs, spiritual and material, for all we seek to do in the Lord's name in Dunstable.

Mission Giving

May is one of our 'Mission Giving' months. Twice a year everyone attending has an opportunity to give specifically to the four Missions which we support, which are:

- 1. Matt Gamston with Grace Baptist Mission in the Philippines carrying out teaching and preaching with churches and groups in fellowship with Cubao Reformed Baptist Church, Manila (Philippines) and the nearby church in San Pedro. £1,000 of this support is set aside this year for the expenses of the Drop-in Camp, which is held in October.
- 2. The Open-Air Mission (OAM) with whom Andy Banton, is involved as General Secretary; Steve Burton works as an Evangelist and Linda Lumley, Ruth Banton and Tess Barnachea work in the OAM Office.
- 3. Christian literature for Eastern Europe via the Roundwood Trust.
- 4. European Missionary Fellowship (EMF) to support Rogério Ramos in his work in Sines, Portugal.

During May please collect an envelope from the rack beside one of the collection boxes and consider prayerfully how you can assist in giving towards the financial needs of the above. Do remember every gift helps however insignificant you think it is. If you do not mark your envelope your gift will be divided equally between the four missions. If, however, you wish to designate your gift, please mark your envelope with the name or names of the work you wish to support and specify how you want the gift divided if you want it to be other than an equal division. Please return your envelopes, via the collection boxes, by the end of May. Tax can be claimed on your mission gifts given by cheque (from those who have signed one of our Gift Aid forms) unless you mark your envelope to the contrary. If it is more convenient for you to spread your giving to these missions over the year then you can do so in the same way as described above; ask for the mission giving envelopes or mark up your own.

Once a year in May we are also inviting additional gifts for the <u>General Fund of Pilgrim Homes</u>. Please use one of the Mission envelopes and mark it 'Pilgrim Homes' if that is where you want your additional gift to go. The same comments about Gift Aid apply.

In addition some may be interested in supporting the General Fund of the Grace Baptist Mission which helps those workers without fully designated support and the office staff at Abingdon. Please mark any gifts given for this purpose.

Over and above financial support, all of those mentioned need everyone's support in prayer, so please bring them before the throne of grace regularly – at home, and at our weekly prayer meetings. There are usually copies of their prayer / news letters in the vestibule, and news from some of these letters is put in the Newsletter from time to time. Please ask Christine Wild (christinewild50@gmail.com), our Mission Secretary, if you want to know more or would like a prayer letter emailed to you. When we have Church Fellowship Meetings linked with their work do try and come to show your support. It will then be a greater encouragement to them in their work for the Lord as well as a help to you in your prayers.

Ways to give tax effectively to the Church (incl. Mission Giving)

Gift Aid

If you are a tax payer, using Gift Aid means that for every pound you give, the Church gets an extra 25 pence from the government, helping your donation go further. On top of that, if you are a higher rate taxpayer you can claim further tax relief on the donation in your annual tax return.

So next time you want to give to the Church, tell David Woodruff you want to Gift Aid it and he will do the rest (confidentially). You only need to sign a simple Gift Aid form and make your gift by cheque or through your bank.

Payroll Giving

If your employer runs a Payroll Giving scheme you can donate to your chosen charities (including the Church) from your salary before tax is deducted, so you get tax relief straight away. For example, if you are a standard rate taxpayer and you give £100 per year it only costs you £80.
