Dear Friends,

What kind of mental picture do we have of Jesus and how he lived? Though he was miraculously conceived his birth was normal (*Luke 2:7*). He grew up through childhood to adulthood. **'And the child grew and became strong in spirit, filled with wisdom; and the grace of God was upon Him'** (*Luke 2:40*). Luke records also that Jesus was obedient to his parents and **'increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and men'** (*2:50*). It is a great blessing and comfort for us to know that Jesus whilst fully divine is also a real man. At his incarnation he took upon himself true humanity and during his life he submitted himself to human limitations and weaknesses – made like us, apart from sin (*Heb 2:17; 4:15*). Every aspect of his life is an example to us all and in particular how he related to his Father.

How did Jesus relate to his Father?

The whole of Jesus' life was one of dependence upon his Father and obedience to his will. How often he said that he had come to do the Father's will (*John 5:19,30; 6:38*). We read remarkable words concerning Christ in Hebrews **'though He was a Son, yet He learned obedience by the things which he suffered'** (*Heb 5:8, see Phil 2:8; John 8:28-29*). It has been suggested this means that which was a spiritual principle became a conscious reality through Christ's suffering and especially his afflictions on the cross. In the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus prayed, **'O My Father, if this cup cannot pass away from Me unless I drink it, Your will be done'** (*Matt 26:42*). Profound consequences have flowed from the Saviour's obedience to his Father's will – even the salvation of countless millions of people. Without his submission and humility where would we be – without God, without hope, going to a lost eternity?

The Saviour's obedience was specific. It was according to his Father's will that was established in eternity, as the triune God decreed salvation, which was implement in time. It was costly also as the Lord set aside the joy and bliss of heaven, the worship of the holy angels and took upon him manhood and ultimately as he became sin for us through his suffering and death at Calvary. However, his obedience also extended to fulfilling the Scriptures perfectly (*Matt 5:17-18*).

It is recorded that Jesus went to a solitary place to pray to his Father (*Mark 1:35; Luke 5:16*). This was true particularly when he had an important task ahead of him such as seeking his Father's will concerning the appointment of his disciples (*Luke 6:12-16*). Though Jesus was the Son of God yet he prayed.

How do we relate to our Father?

How do we measure up to the life of Christ as our great example? Jesus' knowledge of his Father's will was profound but he felt the need to pray. Ours is limited. However, God has revealed to us all what we need to know to live in dependence upon him and be obedient to his will. Though Bible deals with all the situations of life through the precepts, promises, principles, practices and prayers expressed in it are we diligent to discover what these are in order to live lives pleasing to the Lord? (*John 14:21, 23; 1 Thess 4:1; 1 John 2:5*). However, it can be costly (but a costly joy) to set aside time in prayer, reading and meditating on the Scriptures and seeking our heavenly Father's will. It can be costly also to use the time, energy, resources and abilities he has given us in the furtherance of his will. But it is a great joy to be used as instruments of his will, as vessels of weakness (*2 Cor 4:7*), to advance our Father's kingdom.

No doubt we all live busy lives with many demands upon our time but let us remember the words of the Lord to Martha in the midst of her business and anxiety **'Martha, you are worried and troubled about many things. But one thing is needed, and Mary has chosen that good part'** (*Luke 10:41-42*). What was that good part Mary had chosen? She **'sat at Jesus' feet and heard his word'** (*v.39*). May God help each one of us to spend time to sit at Jesus' feet and learn of him and live in ways that please and honour him.

After weeks of uncertain weather, when the sun shone on the morning of Tuesday 25th June, I was very glad. I was making my first visit to Mead Open Farm. Together with 16 adults and 25 children I was on the Toddlers' Outing and responsible for no-one but myself! This was probably the largest number we have had on an Outing as we have recently had new Mums coming to Toddlers and some had even started the week before the Trip. After a safety briefing we were given our timetable for the day beginning with a tractor and trailer ride round some of the animal paddocks where highland cattle, alpacas and sheep were grazing. Walking around afterwards we saw a variety of breeds of horses, pigs, goats and Jacob's sheep. In one barn rabbits of all shapes and sizes had been trained to stay on the top of hay bales while excited children and delighted adults sat down and stroked them. It was the "lamb feeding" which gave me the greatest surprise. The barn was incredibly noisy as the lambs, who had grown well beyond their cuddly stage, were eagerly waiting for the children, now gathered in great numbers, to feed them with milk. But it was clear that it needed a very strong grip on the bottles as the lambs greedily sucked in the milk. On reflection it gave me a new meaning



to the words of Jesus to Peter "Feed my Lambs." There

were plenty of picnic benches for us to sit in groups for lunch, and it was a good opportunity to talk to some of the Mums and to get to know some of them and their children a bit better. Elizabeth Tower Tour

On Monday 22nd July, a group of eleven eagerly awaited the tour up the Elizabeth Tower. After passing through security in Portcullis House, we were met shortly after 11am by our clock guide who gave a brief introduction before we proceeded through a passageway under Bridge Street to the base of the Elizabeth Tower. We started the climb up the 334 stone spiral stairs, pausing about a third of the way up to visit one of the 'U'-shaped rooms that surround the central weight-shaft. Our guide told us about the history and construction of the Elizabeth Tower. Charles Barry won the competition to design the new Palace of Westminster after a devastating fire in 1834. A competition was held to design the clock, which was to be the biggest and most accurate ever created. The construction of the Clock Tower took much longer than anticipated, and the clock mechanism and bells had to be stored for a period of time. The large hour bell, known as 'Big Ben' was tested on a temporary scaffold, but a large crack appeared after the an excessively large hammer was used. After much wrangling, the bell was broken up and recast. Once the tower was complete, the bells were winched up the weight shaft into position and first rung in 1859. After a couple of months, another crack appeared in 'Big Ben' II, which led to the bell being turned and the hammer being reduced.

We continued up the stairs and stopped off to walk behind all four clock-faces. These used to be lit each night by gas burners, but are now lit by special low energy bulbs. We made the final climb up to the Belfry (62 metres high) where we saw the four quarter bells and 'Big Ben', and put in our ear plugs just before the clock struck 12 noon. We were able to get a good view over Westminster and beyond. There is a spiral staircase that leads up from the Belfry to the Ayrton light, which is lit when either House of Parliament is sitting after dark. We descended to the Clock Room to see the mechanism. The bells are wound with the assistance of electric motors, but the clock is still wound by hand and is regularly checked for accuracy and adjusted with old Pennies on the pendulum. There is also a description on the wall with the words to the Westminster Chimes:

*All through this hour

The Clock Tower was renamed the 'Elizabeth Tower' in 2012 to mark the Diamond Jubilee of The Queen. (The large tower at the other end of the Palace of Westminster was renamed the Victoria Tower in 1898 to mark the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria.) Everyone enjoyed the tour and our clock guide, who takes tours up the tower three times each weekday, was very informative. We are thankful to our MP Andrew Selous (South West Bedfordshire) and his PA Christina Keen for arranging this tour of Elizabeth Tower.

Once we were all safely back at ground level, we looked at the artwork of members of Parliament on the first floor of Portcullis House. After a break for lunch, we walked past a statue of William Tyndale in Victoria Embankment Gardens and alongside the Thames to HQS Wellington where there is currently an exhibition to mark seventy years since the Battle of the Atlantic during the Second World War. For most of the war HMS Wellington (as she then was) carried out convoy escort duties across the North Atlantic and off the coast of West Africa. Now HQS Wellington is permanently moored on the River Thames at Temple and is the headquarters of the Honourable Company of Master Mariners. After walking to Blackfriars pier, we caught a Thames Clipper to Canary Wharf, before taking the Jubilee Line to London Bridge and rushing to catch the train back to Luton at the end of a very enjoyable and interesting day.

Gideons International “opens” in Country 196 - Greenland



The Gideon ministry was organised in Greenland on May 24-25, 2013 with 10 new Gideons and 1 transfer from Iceland for a total of 11 members. Greenland is the world's largest island and 85% glacial ice cap. Nuuk is the capital city. The population of the country is about 57,290 of which 64.59% are Protestant. Greenland has been Christianised but not converted. It is an overseas administrative division of Denmark with internal self-government since 1979. The culture

of Greenland, so finely tuned to the inhospitable environment, is devastated by modernity. The dire results are widespread immorality and sexual abuse, alcoholism, mental illness and suicide. Certainly there is a need for the Word of God. The country will be assigned to Gideon Europe West & Middle East Region.

God is faithful to bless the ministry as we continue praying for open doors. Thank you for your faithfulness to pray for countries where the Gideons are not organised. Please remember to lift in prayer these new Gideons as they begin to distribute the Word of God as members of The Gideons International. Pray also for open hearts as God's Word is distributed and the news of the Lord Jesus Christ is shared.

Gideons Bedfordshire Branch

As you know, the local Gideons branch has tried to offer NTs to the Bedfordshire police but our Bedfordshire North branch keeps close contact with Brian Griffen, the police Chaplain at Kempston HQ, and has succeeded in obtaining permission to offer New Testaments to police and staff in their area and are having the Bedfordshire Police crest embossed on a trial printing of 1,500. Please pray that this might be extended into the south Bedfordshire area and that many policemen and women and staff will be pleased to receive a copy and read it.

Also, an agreement has been reached by another branch in Cambridgeshire to offer NTs to the East of England Ambulance Service with their crest embossed on them. They also cover Bedfordshire and support the East Anglia Air Ambulance charity with staff. So please pray that our own branch will be able to distribute more of these NTs in Bedfordshire and thank the Lord that prayers are being answered for the ambulance staff and the police.

On Wednesday 21st August at 8pm, Gideons International Trustee, Geoff Mann, is speaking at Langdale Church about the international aspect of the Gideons work.

Disclosure Barring Service (DBS) Update Service

A number of you have either applied or are about to apply for a new DBS check (what used to be called CRB checks) or you may be applying via another organisation (such as UBM or through your work). One of the drawbacks of the old system was that you had to apply for a new certificate at every organisation you were involved with. With the new DBS system it's possible you may not have to fill in a new form each time. There are some exceptions as different organisations carry out different types of check depending on the type of contact you have with adults and children so your certificate isn't always transferable.

To take advantage of the new system you do have to go online and register for the update service. There does appear to be a time limit of two weeks after you receive your certificate so don't delay too long in doing so. You can find all the information on the DBS website about how to register

Once you have registered, organisations (such as our church) can go online with your permission and check your status meaning you don't have to fill in a new form every time. Registration to the update service lasts a year but if you renew you shouldn't ever have to fill in another application. If you need any advice about what to do, please speak to one of us and we can talk you through the new system.

For those of you with email I have sent out a more detailed explanation which would have taken too much space in the newsletter.

Finances for the Second Quarter of 2013

For the second quarter of 2013 the church finances were as follows:

Income £22,004

Expenditure £36,830

Shortfall £14,826

The reason we have had a shortfall this quarter is that we have made three extra sets of payments. Firstly we agreed to make a donation of £1,000 to the Bookshop to cover last year's shortfall. Secondly we made agreed donations to eight missions totalling £9,800. Lastly we paid £4,750 for rebuilding the wall and ramp outside the Bookshop and re-paving from there to the Hall. One claim for tax on gifts given under Gift Aid during the first quarter, amounting to £2,016, was received and a claim of £1,264 was made for gifts received in the second quarter which came in before the end of June.

We thank all who have given to the work of the church, over the last quarter, and we would record our thanks to the Lord for all He has provided for us. We pray that the Lord will continue to supply all our needs, spiritual and material, for our work in the Lord's name here in Dunstable.

Prayer Waves July 2013

Jean Ellis (Klagenfurt, Austria):

Jean has been working among the deaf in Austria for 33 years. Already living in the country, she met a deaf person and was challenged by the question: 'Who tells the deaf in Austria about the Lord?' There followed six years of learning Austrian sign language and Jean got to know a couple who asked her to interpret at their wedding. This ultimately led to a request for a church service in sign language for the deaf in Klagenfurt, so a monthly service was started with the pastor preaching and Jean interpreting.

The deaf community typically experiences prejudice and social exclusion on many levels. Jean's ministry provides an opportunity to bring the Gospel to them, and to show Christian compassion.

Eight years passed without any conversions but since 2003 the Lord has blessed with a steady harvest of people being saved and baptised. There are currently 13 believers in the group with 25 or more attending services.

The challenge has been to get the Bible into Austrian sign language (the 'heart' language of the community). The Austrian deaf have not been taught German through the means of sign language so struggle to understand written text in German. Jean interprets passages of the Bible so that they can understand.

Mirko and Klaus have emerged as leaders, but they have difficulty in accessing commentaries. Jean's main role here is to do research then pass that on to enable sermon preparation and preaching.

Please pray:

- **Thank God** for what He has done amongst the deaf over the last 30 years.
- **Thank God** for Jean's faithful service and **pray** for her as she reaches retirement age next year. She plans to stay on in Austria and to continue to be involved in the work.
- **Pray** that many who come to the services would be saved and that the believers would be a strong witness to their friends.
- For the country of Austria which remains a major missionary challenge. Things are improving and there are a good number of evangelical churches, but there remain vast areas with no evangelical witness. **Pray** that the Lord will raise up new workers to plant churches and to partner with Austrian Christians reaching this very needy country.

DUNSTABLE FOODBANK

Dear Foodbank supporters

No doubt you will have seen the national media coverage of Trussell Trust figures concerning the dramatic 170% rise in the number of clients coming to Foodbanks across the country for help in 2012-13. Locally, April was also a month of milestones for Dunstable Foodbank. Early in the month we served our 1,000th client since we opened in September last year, and later on we also distributed the 10,000th meal! The week of April 29th was the second busiest we have ever been, serving 69 clients in all—41 adults and 28 under 16s. The trend for even higher demand is clear and we expect this to continue well into the future.

However, we cannot distribute food that we do 't have and we are currently distributing approximately 1/2 ton of food per week. Unfortunately this exceeds our income of food and we have had to draw on our limited resources to buy food to supplement that which is donated.

There fore WE URGENTLY NEED MORE FOOD to meet the growing need. In particular we need:

Tinned spaghetti -most urgent
Sponge puddings - most urgent
Long life milk – most urgent
Tinned vegetables—potatoes, carrots, peas, sweetcorn, etc.

Packet or tinned potatoes
Tins of fish (not tuna)
Meat pies
Custard
Fruit juice

Currently we have adequate supplies of :

Pasta
Soup
Rice
Tinned tomatoes
Baked beans

Other items we always need are:

Sugar
Cereals
Teabags / coffee
Tinned fruit
Jam
Biscuits

Please do whatever you can to bring this to the attention of fellow supporters. We have a great God and He knows our needs. Thank you for your support so far—it is absolutely invaluable and essential.
