Dear Friends,

The death penalty, under Roman law, was the usual punishment for a runaway slave. However, the apostle Paul, who was imprisoned in Rome, sent back Onesimus, a converted runaway slave, to Philemon his Christian master with a letter containing a plea that he would receive his erring slave as a beloved brother in Christ (*Phil 16, see Col 4:9*). Obedience would require **forgiveness and reconciliation** - actions that no slave owner would contemplate. In essence the qualities of forgiveness and reconciliation represent the heart of God and the gospel

Forgiveness

There is a superficial kind of forgiveness, but true forgiveness flows from a heart of love for the forgiven, even as God's forgiveness of sinners is inherent in his love for his fallen creatures – a love so strikingly manifested in the, life, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus (*Col 1:13-14*). Christian forgiveness is not an optional extra but a quality that expresses the very essence of what it means to be a Christian. There are many aspects to forgiveness such as:

a) Forgiveness is a command 'And be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you' (Eph 4:32). Forgiveness, therefore, is a fundamental aspect of our obedience to God and our behaviour towards others.

b) One aspect of the new covenant is that God promises for all who trust him that `**their** sins and lawless deeds I will remember no more' (Heb 8:12). Surely if God has forgiven us our sins and iniquities should we not forgive the lesser things that cause us offence.

c) The Lord's 'model prayer' highlights the relationship between God's forgiveness and ours when he teaches 'for if you forgive men their trespasses your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses' (Matt 6:14-15; see Mark 11:29). There is an instruction and a warning in the words of Christ. May we obey the instruction and heed the warning.

d) It is true that within an unforgiving heart lie bitterness, anger and malice (*Eph 4:31*) the opposite of Paul's exhortation (v.32). Forgiveness leads to real joy in the Lord and fulfilment in the Christian life, knowing that it pleases the Lord (2 Cor 5:9-10).

e) It is the work of the Holy Spirit to conform us to the likeness of our Lord (*Rom 8:29; see Gal 4:19*) and it grieves him (*Eph 4:30*) when we fail to emulate the example of Christ.

Reconciliation

Forgiveness is hollow without reconciliation. Paul writes that through the cross we are reconciled to God (*Eph 2:16;Col 1:21*). God has demonstrated his love for us. Yes, we do need to come to God to seek forgiveness when we recognise sin in our lives and he has promised to forgive us (*1 John 1:9*) and those who have offended should seek forgiveness from the one offended. However, there are times when we can so easily be offended or upset over trivial matters. It is possible also that an 'offender' is not even aware of a grievance committed.

If we feel grieved the biblical way is to be honest with the person concerned and deal with it, rather harbour grudges and resentment (*Matt 18:15*), and thus affect reconciliation. The reverse is true also (*Matt 5:23-25*). Without genuine forgiveness there can be no real reconciliation and no true fellowship but merely a charade of external unity with no 'heart change'.

We all need to be reminded of the Church Covenant especially point five 'to remember each other's weaknesses, failings and infirmities in a spirit of love and affection, seeking the good of the whole church.' May God help each one of us to act upon this promise and freely forgive and be reconciled to someone who has offended us in a spirit of love and humility.

We were a bit limited as to where to set up, as there was a continental style market going all over the place. While preaching Andy Banton had a few heckle him and a largish crowd gathered. The Lord enabled Andy as he dealt with the folk so graciously and five people came forward for a John's gospel each. Some very good conversations were had as a result.



CFM Sunday 24 October.

Albania was declared the first totally atheistic state by its communist dictator Enver Hoxha

(Prime Minster, Head of the Armed Forces, Chancellor, First Secretary etc.). During his rule (1944-1985) he ruthlessly suppressed any opposition and especially religious minorities. Hence, there were very few Christians in the country and those who were rarely met because there was a strict limit on the number of people who could meet together. At the dictators death (1985) David Young (the now retired Director of AEM) was instrumental in encouraging believers in Albania and with the strong support of some believers in the UK a real work of grace has seen many come to faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Paul Davies is now the Director of the work, which is quite a small mission. The Mission's prime task is to seek to establish churches and the support of believers and pastors rather than for the missionaries to become pastors. Over the years, since Hoxha's death, the number of evangelical believers has increased dramatically and a goods number of churches established with their indigenous pastors. The Mission works in the main cities (Tirana and Gjirokaster) and a number of towns and villages.

God has raised up hardworking and godly pastors whose faithfulness has been rewarded by the Lord. There is now an increasing work amongst blind people and students as well as literature work. The Mission, within its limited resources, seeks wherever there are Albanian-speaking people, such as Kosovo and Macedonia, to meet their spiritual needs.

evening when he spoke movingly about the way camps and encouragement camps for believers in August. the gospel has affected individual lives and the way the Lord is working powerfully in a country that was denied the gospel truth for almost 40 years.

Please pray that the Lord will continue to use his Holy Spirit empowered people to proclaim the gospel to Albanian speaking people throughout Europe and grant wisdom to Paul Davies and the mission council as they continue to support believers in Albania and elsewhere.

Latvia

John and Marion McDonald visited Malcolm and Ruth Firth in Riga, Latvia in September and John was able to interview a number of folk following the morning service.

Malcolm is involved with the Latvian Bible Institute which is now the largest evangelical training institute in Latvia with about 150 students, many follow correspondence courses, some from prisons. The Institute is currently looking to rent a new property for its on-going ministry.

The church planting work held in Malcolm and Ruth's home is going well. At least 7 different nationalities are usually represented with a regular flow of new visitors. The group is now looking to officially constitute itself under Latvian law in order to rent a property for worship services. They hope to have premises by Christmas for Sunday services, children's work and provide compassionate help to the local community. There are continued opportunities amongst International students.

Ruth gave an update on the work of GAiN (Global Aid Network). They would like to raise more financial support for the work from within Latvia, but this is not easy. Although there are fewer Latvian helpers, there are new ones, notably some Iranian refugees. Wisdom is needed to know how best to develop the work in a way that efficiently meets needs in the community.

The Lux Mundi literature work has also had problems with hackers accessing their website. This has now been revamped and is being publicised.

Ervands, a Latvian pastor, spoke of the impact of the recent economic crisis on Latvia. Many pastors and Christians have felt the need to leave the country in order to provide for their families but this has weakened the church. However, he testified to God's faithfulness during this time.

- Pray that the Lord would revive his Church in Latvia.

In the evening we heard ministry from Julian Hardyman. It was good to meet and catch up with old DBC members including Mike & Alison Roper, Kathryn & Nigel Hibbard, Thomas and Matthew, and the Baxters from Whittlesey.

The day finished at 6.00pm and was a most enjoyable and challenging day.

Finances for the Third Quarter of 2013

For the third quarter of 2013 the Church finances were as follows:

Income £15,882 Expenditure £19,889 Shortfall £ 4,007

This shortfall has occurred because the church made extra gifts to missions that we support amounting to $\pounds 12,500$. During the quarter the general fund has benefitted from Gift Aid tax reclaimed ($\pounds 1,854$) on gifts given from June to September 2013. We thank all who have given to the work of the Church, over the last quarter, and we would thank our Lord for all He has provided for us. We pray that He will continue to supply all our needs, spiritual and material, for all we do in His name here in Dunstable.

Mission Giving

November is one of our 'Mission Giving' months. Twice a year everyone attending has an opportunity to give specifically to the four missions which we support. Currently these are:

- (a) Matt Gamston with Grace Baptist Mission in the Philippines carrying out teaching and preaching with churches and groups in fellowship with Cubao Reformed Baptist Church, Manila (Philippines) and the nearby church in San Pedro. £1,000 of this support is set aside this year for the expenses of the Dropin Camp, which was held in October. Matt is coming back to the UK in the New Year at a date is yet to be fixed.
- (b) The Open-Air Missiion (OAM) with whom Andy banton is involved as General Secretary; Steve Burton works as an Evangelist and Lind Lumley, Ruth Banton and Tess Barnachea work in the OAM Office.
- (c) Christian literature for Eastern Europe via the Roundwood Trust
- (d) European Missionary Fellowship (EMF) to support Rogerio Ramos in his work in Sines, Portugal.

During November please collect an envelope from the rack by one of the collection boxes and consider prayerfully how you can assist in giving towards the financial needs of the above. Do remember every gift helps however insignificant you think it is. If you do not mark your envelope your gift will be divided equally between the four missions. If, however, you wish to designate your gift, please mark your envelope with the name or names of the work you wish to support and specify how you want the gift divided if you want it to be other than an equal division. Please return your envelopes, via the collection boxes, by the end of November. Tax can be claimed on your mission gifts given by cheque (from those who have signed one of our Gift Aid forms) unless you mark your envelope to the contrary. If it is more convenient for you to spread your giving to these missions over the year then you can do so in the same way as described above; ask for the mission giving envelopes or mark up your own.

In addition some may be interested in supporting the General Fund of the Grace Baptist Mission which helps those workers without fully designated support and the office staff at Abingdon. Please mark any gifts given for this purpose.

As well as financial support, all of the above need everyone's support in prayer, so please bring them before the throne of grace regularly – at home, and at our weekly prayer meetings. There are usually copies of their prayer / news letters in the vestibule, and news from some of these letters is put in the Newsletter from time to time. Please ask Christine Wild, our Mission Secretary, if you want to know more or would like a prayer letter emailed to you. When we have Church Fellowship Meetings linked with their work do try and come to show your support. It will then be a greater encouragement to them in their work for the Lord as well as a help to you in your prayers.
